


YOU'LL BE SURPRISED when you start moving those little pieces of wood around!

Already over 1000 pictures have been discovered - mostly by children


The easiest way is first to make the pictures illustrated on the cards and the box cover. Then see how many *original* ones you can create. There are only three different kinds of wooden pieces: here they are with their names and abbreviations:



It is very simple, but, look out for the short side of T2, marked S. If a picture does not fit tightly it is usually because the S side is turned wrong.

Children Originate Things Easily

Here is a Donkey's Head a fourteen-year-old boy made in less than a minute with six pieces. The solution shows how he assembled the pieces and just where he put the S side of T2.

Now see what you can do! Experiment a minute or two and something interesting is sure to pop out




